BEAUTY

1 Peter 3:3-4

Your beauty should not come from outward adornment, such as elaborate hairstyles and the wearing of gold jewellery or fine clothes. Rather, it should be that of your inner self, the unfading beauty of a gentle and quiet spirit, which is of great worth in God's sight.

Too often, our children are drawn to superficial materialism and false beauty and fail to recognise the beauty around them or fully understand their worth as individuals. Within school, there are occasions where children are drawn to others because of the size of pencil cases, or the label on their bags or jackets;

consequently, a false sense of beauty is created and misguided adoration occurs. At St. Stephen's, we encourage children to see (like Peter) the worth of the inner self - discarding the cultural climate, that can be so damaging in shaping the young person's thinking.

TRUST

Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all yours ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight.

*Proverbs*3:5-6

Trusting a friend, colleague, staff member or any member of our community is the path to harmony. Many children and adults alike adopt a cynical stance, often building barriers, suspicion and doubt. In a Christian community, trust is an imperative ingredient in all of our relationships. Even when the fullness of a situation has not been revealed - trust can overcome many of life's uncertainties. Just as Jesus trusted in the Father at the time of his crucifixion, we need to trust in each other and acknowledge that there is a greater power at work.

At St. Stephen's, we demonstrate trust in our faith journey with the church. The foundations in this relationship can only be sown, it is up to the individual to take ownership of their relationship and to be empowered to trust others and God in our daily interactions together. When seeds are sown they take time to develop and blossom into new life and establish strong and powerful roots. Similarly our relationships with each other can only develop if they are given nourishment and time to evolve and flourish.



JUSTICE

This is what the Lord asks of you: only this, to act justly, to love tenderly and to walk humbly with your God.

Micah 6:8

In Christian communities, there are many Gospel values which seek to bring us closer together. Justice is often confused with revenge and retribution and there are occasions where the latter has taken precedence over reconciliation.

Social justice allows the human dignity of every person to be respected and the resulting rights are safeguarded and championed without reservation. A society is not perfected by laws, only by the love of neighbours, which makes it possible for everyone to 'look upon his neighbour as another self'. (Gaudium et Spes, 27:1

TOLERANCE

*Mark*10:13-14

Jesus Blesses Little Children.

People were bringing little children to him in order that he might touch them; and the disciples spoke sternly to them. But when Jesus saw this, he was indignant and said to them, "Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs.

Tolerance is the measure with which we attempt to absorb and celebrate differences. It is an acceptance of our imperfections and at St. Stephen's we work together with our community to understand the differences in society and the similarities we find in each other.

In a world where tolerance is often lacking and divisions are fuelling war, conflict and fear, there is a need to demonstrate tolerance. Children need to be taught tolerance, or they may become part of such conflicts.

COMPASSION

The Harvest is Great, the Labourers Few.

Matthew 9:35-38

Then Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues, and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom, and curing every disease and every sickness. When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest.

There are many times during the day when our community is called to demonstrate compassion towards one another. As Jesus so often demonstrated compassion towards the sick or the needy, we are the vehicle for recognising and teaching how to understand the sufferings of another being. At St. Stephen's, children learn the

value of compassion and its contribution to social good - empathising with those whom are suffering and are less fortunate than ourselves. Being compassionate does not only allow us to recognise the needy, it allows us to show empathy towards others; particularly during the difficult situations we may encounter personally.

CHARITY

*Proverbs*22:9

He who is generous will be blessed, for he gives some of his food to the poor.

The common good means assuming responsibility for others and this must be the business of everyone. Charitable thinking is the responsibility of all within St. Stephen's community, and such actions are part of the school's regular routine. Charity is not exclusively about raising money- it is about the giving of the little things to all peoples; be it money, materials, prayers, thoughts or time.





GOODWILL

Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of goodwill.

2:14

People of goodwill usually act through selflessness and a desire to help others. We need to exploit opportunities and appreciate that there are times where goodwill will need to occur in order to move a situation forward. When the spirit of generosity prevails, unity and communion overcome

difficulties and negative situations. Many positives are borne from goodwill and consequently goodwill is often seen as the prerequisite to a harmonious community. At St. Stephen's, we understand the importance and necessity of goodwill and how it can be the cornerstone for a successful relationship.

RESILIENCE

Fear not, for I am with you; be not dismayed, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my righteous right hand.

Isaiah 41:10

Friendships require perseverance and determination. At St. Stephen's, we need to ensure that we remain loyal to our mission statement's virtues and values. When relationships are tested - loyalty is often found to be the missing component. Loyalty comes in different forms and may be used to

describe the way we demonstrate faithfulness and commitment to our school community. When loyalty is displayed, there is a strong feeling of support and allegiance to each other and our shared vision. Subsequently, the community feels positive when we are supportive of one another.

Those who demonstrate resilience and tenacity often achieve more because they are not afraid of failure. With God's help, St. Stephen's pupils are beckoned to try new things, to learn new skills and to conquer the fear of failure. Within any relationship, learning or educational matter, there will

always be up and downs, successes and failures, but without the capacity to bounce back, it would be impossible for technological, scientific and spiritual advances to occur. With this in mind, we seek to create resilient beings, who actively embrace mistakes and use failure to their advantage.

At St. Stephen's, pupils are encouraged to journey towards success, by setting realistic goals: they should display a strong sense of character and tenacity to accomplish their aims and objectives.

FORGIVENESS

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LOVE

Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end.

In order for our community to give love to each other, we firstly need to love ourselves and accept ourselves for who we are. If one does not experience love, acceptance and support - it is impossible to understand how to outpour that love onto others; consequently, we would be empty and without feeling. At St. Stephen's, pupils are taught to: love each other;

show love through their actions; and love God's world. High priority is given to educating our young people about the importance of loving the universal church and its contents. In scripture, Paul describes love as the greatest commandment of all and we see love as the greatest gift - enabling us to create a culture of happiness within our school.

FRIENDLINESS

1 Corinthians

12:12-14

For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in one Spirit we were all baptised into one body-Jews or Greeks, slaves or free-and all were made to drink of one Spirit. For the body does not consist of one member but of many.

A friendly community is a happy community. Effective socialisation allows friendships to be built and sustained - between each member of the community. As Christ reached out to the poor, meek, the lowly and the rich, we too should reach out in friendship to form Christian fellowships with those in and outside of our everyday circles. When we demonstrate friendliness

to others, we create united relationships: sharing in one another's joys and sorrows - creating ideas and experiences. At St. Stephen's, we recognise that relationships blossom when time is given generously to each individual in the community. We have a moral obligation to support our peers and friendliness is the cornerstone to cementing positive relationships.

RESPECT

But we appeal to you, brothers and sisters, to respect those who labour among you, and have charge of you in the Lord and admonish you; esteem them very highly in love because of their work. Be at peace among yourselves

<u>Thessalonians</u> 5:12-13

There are times in the bible when Jesus did not immediately command the respect of his followers and there are times when he did not get the admiration that he deserved. In school, there may be conflict or occasions when we do not always agree with the outcome or decision made, yet, we must remain respectful of the authoritative bodies. St. Stephen's believes that our

community needs to demonstrate self-respect in our interactions, discussion, sportsmanship and presentation. We teach the skills of negotiation, consideration and conviction. When respect is instilled in an individual, reverence for the holy and sacred can be taught.

CATHOLIC FAITH

Luke

18:27

But he said, "What is impossible with men is possible with God."

Hebrews (11:1) states: "Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." St. Stephen's is a faith-filled Catholic community, where high priority is given to: the evangelisation of the community; family Religious catechesis; strong Education; opportunities for collective worship and; the opportunity to live out the faith through the actions of our charitable works. As a community that works for the universal body of the world, we are summoned to be at service to God and to each other.
